

AN UPDATE FROM THE FIELD:

Burnet's HIV Prevention Programs

We talk to Professor Mark Stoové about HIV as a health threat here in Australia and around the world. It's a story of extreme inequity.



I think the key thing that I'd like Burnet's supporters to know about our work in the HIV area is the vast differences between HIV in Australia and HIV in other countries where Burnet has a presence.

IN AUSTRALIA

"In the last five years HIV diagnoses in Australia have halved, from roughly 1000 a year to about 500. So we've been really successful in Australia with our HIV strategies. Burnet has played a part in that, and that means that you, our supporters, have also played a part.

"Australia has one of the best health care systems in the world. That means we've also got excellent access to testing and high quality models of care for those diagnosed with HIV. When people are diagnosed in Australia, they generally start treatment straight away, which also reduces transmission. Similar to PrEP, HIV treatment lowers virus levels, preventing transmission. Additionally, Australia provides ample access to pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP), an antiviral medication taken to prevent infection.

"The biggest issue here in Australia can be found in the cracks where access to our world-best health system falls short. What we're finding is that community members in outer suburbs or regional areas, where there are fewer specialist clinics, are sometimes reluctant to disclose risk factors because of fear of stigma and discrimination in health settings and the community. This means they miss out on testing, early diagnosis, or access to PrEP. The migrant and international student community in Australia is another area where this stigma exists, and accessing services is also complicated by the fact that these groups do not have access to Medicare.

"To address these gaps it's really important to look at ways to take our best practice response and make it more accessible. Australia's first shopfront, community-based and peer-led HIV testing service for gay men was established by Burnet in collaboration with the Victorian AIDS Council (now Thorne Harbour Health) and the Victorian Government. This is a place where people can access free HIV services in a safe environment. The next challenge for us is developing self-testing and virtual clinics here in Australia."

AND AROUND THE WORLD

"Unfortunately, the response to HIV is going backwards in some countries. This is due to a range of reasons – resource constraints, conservative governments, widespread stigma and criminalisation of at-risk groups, internal political issues, military strife, and so on.

"Burnet's biggest strength now lies in taking our expertise, developed through our local and international programs, into more countries to share our learnings and help create strong support networks and strengthen HIV health systems. We are able to add value as we have a history of building relationships in challenging environments, and can help educate at-risk communities and health care workers to navigate delicate issues. This sort of capability building is core to Burnet's mission of health equity, ensuring no-one is left behind."

"Thanks in part to the very generous ongoing support of donors since the earliest days of the HIV/AIDS epidemic, Burnet has made a substantial contribution to Australia's success in the HIV space. We're now one of the lowest diagnosing countries in the world – but so many countries don't have access to the expertise and the programs that we've been able to develop here. The challenge we set ourselves is to do something about that."

Supporting HIV research in perpetuity

Robert Cheffers dedicated his life to the comfort and health of others.

After many years as a nurse at the Alfred Hospital, he decided to make his legacy ongoing support of research into infectious diseases, especially HIV, and improvement of public health in Australia and overseas.

Although Robert suffered from multiple health issues in his later life, he found great solace in his beloved dogs – Margo, Bonnie and Emma – so much so that he set up a charitable trust in their name with Burnet as the sole beneficiary.
